

Participating in a Discussion Forum in Moodle

One of the assignments required from your online instructor will be to post to a discussion forum. The discussion forum is a great way to collaborate with your peers and discuss course content according to the guidelines set by your instructor.

This tutorial will demonstrate the five different types of discussion forums in Moodle:


- Single Simple Discussion
- Each Person Posts One Discussion
- Standard Forum for General Use
- Questions and Answers (Q & A)
- Standard Forum Displayed in Blog-like Format

I. Single Simple Discussion

In this type of forum, new posts or topics are only created by instructors. Students have the ability to comment on an existing thread only.

Step 1

Select the appropriate forum to open the discussion.

Notice the “Discussion Subscription” box is checked, this will send you notifications when other students post to this thread. Uncheck the box to stop receiving notifications.


II. Each Person Post One Discussion

In this type of forum, you will post a single discussion thread, but will have the ability to comment on the posts of other students.

Step 1

After opening the forum, read the question and instructions posted by your instructor, then select:

Add new discussion topic



III. Standard Forum for General Use

In this type of forum, you will see a subject list of discussions, and must select a discussion to see the entire contents. You will also have the option of opening a new discussion topic.

Step 1

Select the discussion forum you wish to open under “Discussion, or select:

Add new discussion topic

to create a new discussion thread.

IV. Questions and Answers

This forum is used when a teacher wants a student to answer a question, you will not be able to create new topics or a new thread. You will not have the ability to see the answers of other students, until you post your own.

Step 1

Select the title of the discussion question you wish to answer under "Discussion".



V. Standard Forum Displayed in Blog-like Format

This forum works similar to the Standard Forum, but each discussion is displayed as if it were a blog. To post in this type of forum, follow section III of this tutorial, “Standard Forum for General Use”.
